### **DISCUSSIONS**

On motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board accepted and approved the consent agenda.

Chris Brausch, Sanitary Engineer, was present along with staff for a work session to discuss the Warren County Water Master Plan.

David Walling, Chief Deputy Sanitary Engineer, presented the attached PowerPoint presentation and reviewed the options and the costs associated with each option. He also reviewed the financing options and costs/fees associated with each option.

Commissioner Grossmann questioned the costs associated with, as well as the ability of Greater Cincinnati Water Works taking over the Warren County Water System like they did in the City of Mason.

Upon discussion, the Board directed staff to request a presentation from Greater Cincinnati Water Works at a later date.

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Paul Kindell, Telecommunications Director, was present to discuss the Request for Proposals received relative to the Warren County VOiP Telephone System.

Mr. Kindell reviewed the list of submittals and the review committee's findings and recommendation to proceed with BCS Shoretel as the selected vendor.

Upon discussion, the Board resolved (Resolution #16-368) to select BCS Shoretel as the vendor for the Voice Over iP Telephone System Request for Proposals and authorize staff to begin contract negotiations.

### CONTINUATION OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING UNION VILLAGE-OTTERBEIN STAGE 2 PUD IN TURTLECREEK TOWNSHIP

The continuation of the administrative hearing relative to the Stage 2 PUD for Union Village-Otterbein in Turtlecreek Township was reconvened this 8<sup>th</sup> day of March 2016, in the Commissioners' Meeting Room.

Bruce McGary, Assistant Prosecutor, reviewed the events of the previous hearing and stated he has re-written condition #9 which Otterbein's legal counsel completely rewrote as well. He then stated that as of this morning, they are not in agreement on the wording for Condition #9.

Jeff Kmet, Otterbein Home, requested the Board to continue this hearing for one week.

Upon further discussion, the Board resolved (Resolution #16-0369) to continue the administrative hearing to March 15, 2016, at 9:30 a.m.

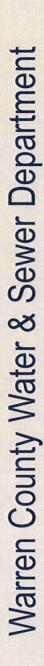

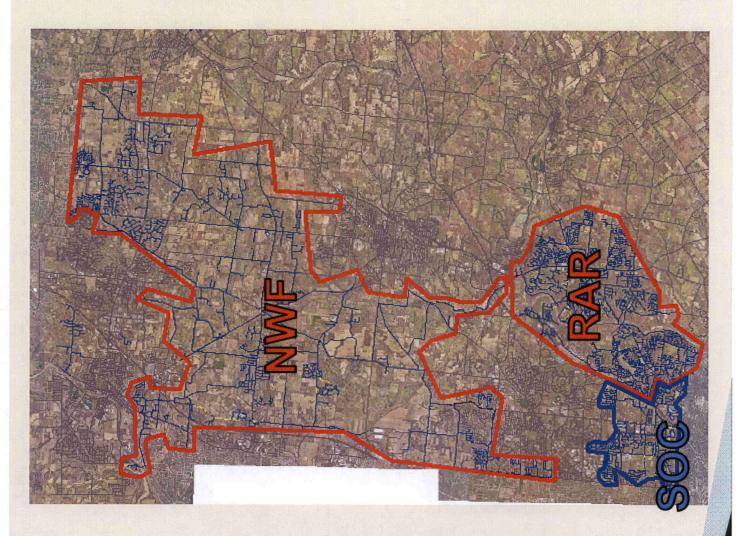

Soften water at NWF and RAR, quality increases for 23,000 accounts, provide future peak demands with own resources



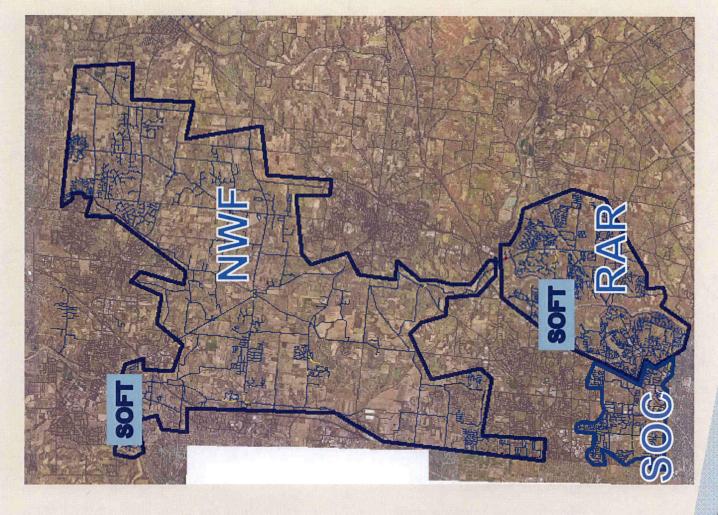
### Water Master Plan Option 2A

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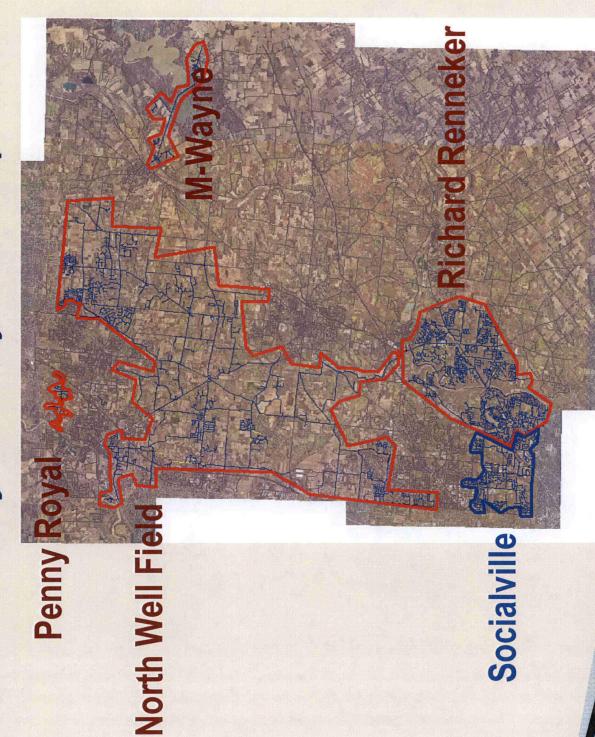
